SUBJECT:	Announcement of 2001 Information Technology (IT) Scholarship Winners

1. <u>Purpose</u>. To announce the winners of the 2001 IT Scholarship.

2. <u>Background</u>. The Federation of Government Information Processing Council/Industry Advisory Council (FGIPC/IAC) Scholarship is intended to provide Job Corps students and graduates with the opportunity to pursue careers in the IT industry. The IT Scholarship Fund was established as a result of interest expressed by the FGIPC/IAC. The scholarship offers students financial support to continue their training in the IT field, and assists in filling the shortage of skilled IT workers.

3. <u>Payment Procedures</u>. Each recipient of the IT Scholarship will be eligible to receive up to \$5,000 in reimbursable expenses associated with the pursuit of a certificate or degree program in the IT field. The payment process will be determined in consultation with the recipient. Each recipient may choose to have the National Job Corps Association make checks payable directly to the educational institution for the exact amount of the tuition and educational-related expenses, or they may choose to provide receipts and certification of completion, and be directly reimbursed for expenses.

4. <u>Action</u>. Addressees are to ensure that a copy of this Notice is distributed to their appropriate staff. Regions and centers should prepare and release a press statement announcing their winner.

5. <u>Expiration Date</u>. Until superseded.
