GLOBAL YOUTH SERVICE DAY & EARTH WEEK 2012 FINAL REPORT

JOB CORPS NATIONAL PARTICIPATION

This year, Job Corps once again coordinated efforts to leverage two annual community service events: Global Youth Service Day (GYSD), April 20-22, 2012; and Earth Week, April 16-22, 2012. Both events mobilize millions of youth around the world to improve their communities through service and service learning, and provided students and staff opportunities to participate in activities that support a greener world. GYSD and Earth Week events provide opportunities for Job Corps centers to reach out to their communities, increase community awareness of Job Corps, and give students opportunities to connect with employers and community organizations.

In 2012, **112** Job Corps centers, **15,063** students and **3,285** staff members organized and volunteered in GYSD and Earth Week activities across the country, bringing the total number of Job Corps participants to **18,348.** Job Corps Centers collaborated with **565** Employer and Community Volunteers, bringing the total volunteer participation to **18,913** for GYSD and Earth Week.

The following is a summary of Job Corps participation in GYSD/Earth Week since 2009.

Global Youth Service Day and Earth Week Highlights of 2012 Events

The Arecibo Job Corps Center's career technical training (CTT) trades participated in a recycling competition for GYSD/Earth Day. CTT students engaged in a competition by gathering recyclable materials around center to create interesting items for an exhibit. The Licensed Practical Nursing trade made a bridal dress out of trash bags, the Electrical trade built table lamps with hard hats and created a women's purse and earrings made from computer keyboards. The Retail Sales trade made a chair out of cans, and the Office Administration trade made desk accessories from cartons, plastic, tires and newspapers. The Facilities Maintenance trade made a garden out of newsprint, cardboard, vegetable peelings and leaves. The Licensed Practical Nurse, Electrical, and Office Administration trades placed first, second and third respectively.

Earth Day activities at the *Grafton Job Corps Center* included planting new trees and flowers on campus. Staff and students also transplanted existing flowers. Students learned to distinguish flowers from weeds and other flora, and gained a greater appreciation of their natural surroundings.

At the *Jacksonville Job Corps Center*, GYSD was community driven. Students picked up more than 2,000 cigarette butts, cleaned underbrush from trees, filled more than 40 large bags of trash, pulled old tires from the lakes, cleaned cabins and swept cobwebs from around park buildings. Additionally, staff members provided a day of service at a local nursing home. "It was truly a community affair," said Joanne Manning, business community liaison.

The Kittrell Job Corps Center Student Government Association held a kick-off assembly. During the assembly, students were informed of the significance of Earth Week activities. A variety of activities were held, including an Earth Day Every Day (EDED) Go Green Fair, where all CTT trades made a presentation on their green initiatives. In the Education Department, students held an EDED essay, poem, and song contest. In Social Development, the dormitories sponsored a recycling competition between the male and female dorms. The winner was decided by the weight and number of recycled material collected. All winners were recognized during a special assembly ceremony held in the center gymnasium. The Kittrell Fire Department Chief conducted a presentation on energy conservation. On April 21, 2012, The Henderson Daily Dispatch carried an article highlighting these efforts.

For GYSD, the *Atterbury Job Corps Center* partnered with the local United Way to perform rescue efforts for tornado victims. As a result of this activity, the *Atterbury Job Corps Center* was asked to be a partner in providing skilled laborers for tornado clean-up efforts. Staff is working to assign *Atterbury Job Corps Center* students.

The *Milwaukee Job Corps Center's* "Green Team" learned about sustainability by planting a center garden, including fruits and vegetables, which the center will be able to use. The center also started a compost bin. The Green Team partnered with the Multicultural Awareness Committee to purchase and plant a tree for the beautification of the center. Students worked

with the neighborhood association by distributing flyers to recruit community members for a clean-up day. Students also helped to clean garden plots at a local park so the community can begin planting its community garden.

The *Joliet Job Corps Center* held several events for Earth Week, including an Earth Day assembly, Earth Fair (six vendors educating on sustainability) and a volunteer project. More than 100 students and 20 stenciled "Dump No Waste, Leads to River" on storm drains for the City of Joliet. In addition, Pathfinders Social Service Agency conducted a tree-climbing team building activity, which allowed student participants to overcome their fears of heights, and helped build relationships.

The *New Orleans Job Corps Center* hosted a Green Fair that featured six of the leading environmental organizations in New Orleans, including the city's only Fortune 500 Company, Entergy.

The *Roswell Job Corps Center* celebrated Earth Week by having classrooms and offices disconnect their overhead lighting and use the natural daylight for one hour. An all-center assembly, with a presentation by the head zookeeper of the local Spring River Park and Zoo, addressed climate change in New Mexico. The zookeeper brought a grey horned owl for demonstration and further discussion. A tree for each CTT area was planted at the center, including fruit trees to be used in future culinary arts activities.

The *Guthrie Job Corps Center* students met at the Cox Convention Center to help unload trucks for the Ben E. Keith Food Show. The students met with possible work-based learning participants and future employers at the event.

The *Carville Job Corps Center Students* participated in the Louisiana Earth Day Celebration in Baton Rouge, La. Students and staff participated with ExxonMobil and the Greater Baton Rouge Arts Council, assisting youth with various exhibits that promoted protecting the earth and the environment.

The *Harpers Ferry Job Corps Center* obtained several leads on work based learning internships for students as a result of their involvement in GYSD and Earth Week. They also were able to renew their partnership with the National Park Service, and increase public awareness of Job Corps' good deeds. The Carpentry and Cement trade students built a wood carpet trail at Catoctin Mountain National Park for mobility-impaired individuals.

The students and staff at the *Muhlenburg Job Corps Center* (MJCC) planted trees, flowers and shrubs. They also installed 24 new solar panels that produce 31 kilowatts daily. These new panels will produce enough electricity to take care of the power needs of the MJCC Welcome Center. The center sponsored a month-long energy savings contest in the dorms. The winning dorm was treated to a pizza party. "The Earth Day events made our community and Job Corps students more aware of our limited natural resources, and how we should all be good stewards of each of the natural resources we have been given."

The *Maui Job Corps Center* students and staff raised \$2,100 and collected 320 pounds of food for the Hawaii Food Bank.

Students at the *Phoenix Job Corps Center* had to come up with creative pieces that incorporated the theme "reduce, recycle, reuse." This provided an opportunity for students to think about their environment and to find an interesting way to reinforce the importance of going green during lunch, with the rest of the student body. Some of the projects involved picking up trash in the community. The winning project, created by the Facilities Maintenance trade, was two iron-back patio chairs and a table made from discarded wood.
