SUBJECT: Federal Poverty Guidelines and Lower Living Standard Income Level
Guidelines for 2002

1. Purpose. To transmit the annual update of the Federal Poverty Guidelines published by the Department of Health and Human Services and the 2002 Lower Living Standard Income Level (LLSIL) guidelines published by the Department of Labor.
2. Reference. Job Corps Policy and Requirements Handbook (PRH), Chapter 1, Exhibit 1-1, Criterion D - Low Income.
3. Background. Job Corps uses both the Federal Poverty Guidelines and LLSIL guidelines to determine eligibility for Job Corps under the low-income criterion. These are used to determine eligibility when the applicant and/or family have received earned income, which must be considered in making a determination of eligibility. Attachment A, Poverty Guidelines were published in the Federal Register on February 14, 2002, and Attachment B, LLSIL guidelines were published in the Federal Register on April 8, 2002.

Remember, to be eligible for Job Corps under the low income criterion, an individual must be a member of a family living in a single residence, which has received a total family income for the 6-month (annualized) period prior to application which, in relation to family size, is not in excess of the higher of:

- a. The poverty level determined in accordance with criteria established by the Department of Health and Human Services; or,
- b. 70 percent of the LLSIL published by the Department of Labor.

The 6-month amount must be annualized to determine eligibility under either the Poverty Guidelines or the LLSIL. Both are based on annual incomes.

Please note that income is not a component in determining eligibility for an applicant who receives, or is a member of a family living in a single residence, which receives cash welfare payments, such as AFDC or general assistance, or food stamps; or a foster child for whom state or local government payments are made; or a ward of the state or court.

4. Action. Outreach and admissions agencies should begin using the 2002 guidelines immediately.
5. Expiration Date. Upon receipt of the 2003 guidelines.
