SUBJECT: Poverty Guidelines and Lower Living Standard Income Level Guidelines
 for 2006

1. Purpose. To transmit the annual update of the Poverty Guidelines published by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Lower Living Standard Income Level (LLSIL) guidelines published by the Department of Labor (DOL).
2. Reference. Job Corps Policy and Requirements Handbook (PRH), Chapter 1, Exhibit 1-1, Eligibility Criteria D: Low Income.
3. Background. Job Corps uses both the HHS Poverty Guidelines and the LLSIL Guidelines for assessing income eligibility. Attachment A, the 2006 HHS Poverty Guidelines, was published in the Federal Register on January 24, 2006, and is available online at <http://aspe.hhs.gov/poverty/06fedreg.htm>. Attachment B, the 2006 LLSIL guidelines, were published in the Federal Register on June 1, 2006 and are available online at <http://www.doleta.gov/lisil/>.

To be eligible for Job Corps under the low-income criterion, an individual must be a member of a family living in a single residence, which has received a total family income for the 6-month (annualized) period prior to application, which, in relation to family size, is not in excess of the higher of one of the following income standards:

- a. The poverty level determined in accordance with criteria established by HHS

- b. Seventy percent of the LLSIL published by DOL

Please note that the 6-month amount must be annualized to determine eligibility under either the HHS Poverty Guidelines or the LLSIL guidelines. Both are based on annual incomes.

Please note also that income is not a component in determining eligibility for an applicant who meets one of the criteria below.

- Receives cash welfare payments, such as Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or general assistance, or food stamps
 - Is a member of a family living in a single residence which receives cash welfare payments, such as TANF or general assistance, or food stamps
 - Is a foster child for whom state or local government payments are made, or a ward of the state or court
4. Action. Outreach and admissions (OA) agencies should begin using the 2006 guidelines immediately. Addressees are to ensure that a copy of this Instruction is distributed to the appropriate staff. This Instruction supercedes Program Instruction Notice 04-12.
5. Expiration Date. Upon receipt of the 2007 guidelines.
