SUBJECT:	High School Equivalency (HSE) Center Updates

- 1. <u>Purpose</u>. To get a status update of centers' HSE testing transitions during 2014.
- 2. <u>Background</u>. In 2012, Job Corps began a large-scale transition from the GED 2002 to three new HSE tests GED 2014, HiSET and TASC. The transition continues as states continue to change and add HSE test options and test developers issue new test versions as they create closer alignment to the Common Core State Standards. A high school diploma remains the preferable credential for Job Corps students. However, centers must also provide effective HSE programs as an option for students. This Program Instruction Notice seeks to ascertain the effectiveness of HSE programming on centers, the challenges centers may face, and student performance outcomes for HSE attainment.
